Top Mass Public High School Accepts Students from Bourne, Wareham and Carver. Sturgis Charter Public School Tops Newsweek List.

When Newsweek released this year's top public schools in the country, Sturgis Charter Public School leapfrogged to #27 in the nation, #1 among Massachusetts high schools. Sturgis is in Hyannis and has a limited geographic area it serves. It's charter focuses on Wareham, Plymouth, Carver and Barnstable County.

A tribute to the core work, curriculum and dedication of the staff at Sturgis, Newsweek continues to recognize the college-ready students graduating from this charter school.

The school of just 402 students is selected by lottery, with no fee and no test to be admitted. This past year, Sturgis had over 225 applications for just 100 spots. With names picked out of a hat, any student from the area has

a chance to get into this academically rigorous school.

The cornerstone of Sturgis is an "IB for All" program which requires that all juniors and seniors be fully immersed in the International Baccalaureate program. The program is challenging and world renowned, requiring heavy academic coursework, projects and testing. But it all pays off as IB graduates find they have been well prepared for university.

Sturgis is located on Main Street in Hyannis, in a building which previously housed a furniture store. The facility is

a bit non-traditional and the average class size of 17 is also a bit out of the norm. All in all, Sturgis Charter Public School is a great option for students in Wareham, Bourne and Carver. The admissions process kicks off soon. Visit www.sturgischarterschool.org for more information.

Rep. Gifford Fights for More Local Aid for Schools, Police and Fire

I know our towns are struggling to make ends meet. From layoffs and furloughs to delaying equipment or textbook purchases, we just do not have enough funding to do the things we need to do - and we are all paying the price. Whether it is reduced response times by emergency personnel, fewer programs for seniors or higher class sizes, this financial crisis is touching all those who rely on town services.

Now, more than ever, it is important that we are getting our fair share of state funding. For decades, the funding formulas have unfairly made residential property values more important than income in determining state funding.

That hurts towns like ours, where water views or abutting conservation areas drive up values while the majority of our people are blue-collar workers or retirees on fixed incomes. The current formula helps cities like Lowell, Brockton, Springfield and Boston over suburban communities like ours.

I have, and continue to fight to get more Chapter 70 funding for our schools, and more local aid for our town services. Having a Senate President from Plymouth should help our efforts to change the formula. It is the first time in memory that a legislative leader is not from Suffolk County. I am hopeful that the time has come.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Oil Spill Legislation Finalized



A revision to the Buzzards Bay Oil Spill law will come very soon. As we go to print, this bill is on its way to the governor for signature. The revision will update the law, making it safer and more manageable for the personnel critical to the safety of the Bay.

I continue to fight for changes to the 40b affordable housing law. The law allows builders to bypass local zoning laws if the town does not have 10% affordable housing. While I support affordable housing, the law is flawed by not including mobile homes towards the town's 10%. There is great pressure to make many changes to the law, which makes my colleagues leery of opening the law up for any adjustment. I will keep fighting for this make-sense solution which will help our towns.
